Educational Outing on Saturday 21 December 2013 by Richard Lewis

17 members in 9 cars turned up bright and early at 7.30am on the Saturday morning where they proceeded in convoy towards Fouriesburg for a visit to Denmar Estates owned by Denton Osler. They bottle 50 000 litres of milk a day – 1,3mil litres per month. Peter van der Westhuizen who manages the dairy and fruit juice section gave us a very informative lecture on how the process, from collection from local farmers to distribution of the bottled products, takes place. Thereafter we were given a detailed tour of the production line where it was clear that their values of quality and service was paramount. The technology is incredible and the speed at which it is all done was remarkable. Our vice – chairman Danie Poggenpoel works for Denmar and our thanks to him for organising this tour.

Danie also organised a tour of the BloukruinLandgoed Estates owned by Gilly Scheepers where we again were taken on an informed tour of the process involved in the production, sorting and distribution of eggs, again at production levels that completely boggles the mind.

All members left very informed on the production of both milk and eggs – and we then headed off to a brunch at the Fouriesburg Country Inn where we had an incredible meal and some good interaction between members. Danie unfortunately suffered problems with his wheel bearing but he sorted for it to be carted back home and the rest of us headed off home all agreeing that the combination of a trip out linked to an extra benefit such as the educational tours we had experienced made for a valuable day out.

Cuba Car Import Restrictions To Be Lifed Soon



The communist island country of Cuba is a paradise for classic car lovers from outside the country. That's because almost every car that runs on the streets of Cuba are decades old American classics, many of them over 50 years old! This unique sight is made possible due to the communist government which had imposed restrictions on car imports some 50 years ago. Cubans though this is no less than a nightmare. Being a communist country, citizens can only buy cars from the government, however, very few new cars are imported. While citizens have been allowed to trade used cars among themselves for the last two years, those who want to own new cars are required to get a permit card from the government. Obtaining the said authorization card, however, is next to impossible. These cards are issued in extremely limited numbers and most of the time they cost more than the car itself.

The restrictions have led to corruption and underground sales of cars. People with plenty of money to spare bribe officials to obtain permits and these cards have also started being issued illegally at higher prices. The Washington Post quotes: "It's become clear that while private sales of cars between individuals has developed smoothly, the sale of cars using 'authorization cards' has been inadequate and obsolete," the Communist Party newspaper Granma declared. "The card, apart from being overly bureaucratic, became a source of speculation and illicit self-enrichment. "The import restrictions have thus started to hurt the government financially and is one of the reasons why President Raul Castro has decided to change the half a century long rule. Soon, permit cards will no longer be required to purchase new cars and anyone with enough money will be allowed to buy them from the government. The Cuban government will soon start sales of new and used cars, motorcycles, small trucks and microbuses to its citizens. Having said that, the cost of these cars will continue to be steep, enabling only the affluent to purchase new rides while the remaining population continues to struggle to keep their old cars running. But still, some change for the good is better than no change at all.

John Deere Tractor History

Deere & Company was founded in 1868 by blacksmith John Deere. Deere had achieved great success in 1837 when he built a plow from highly polished steel. Deere & Company entered the tractor manufacturing business in 1918. Deere sold a small number of tractors designed by Joseph Dain, with limited success. That same year, Deere purchased the Waterloo Gasoline Traction Engine Company, that built the Waterloo Boy tractor. In late 1923, John Deere introduced the Model D, which remained in production for the next 30 years. Deere became a dominant force in tractor production with the 4020 in 1963.



Meet Tucker 1052, the 52nd car of 51 built

Of the 51 Tucker automobiles built, John Schuler's car is number 52.

It's not new math, but Schuler's car will be a new addition to the roster of whole Tuckers. However, its parts have been around since Tucker stopped assembling cars in the Windy City in 1948.

When the inventory of the Tucker Corp. was counted car by car and piece by piece under court order on March 3, 1949, the company listed 38 drivable cars, an additional 13 more cars that awaited final assembly and truckloads of parts: test chassis, and new interior and body and mechanical parts that were intended to be used in construction of new cars that never were — at least until 2013. Parts such as a chassis and firewall stamped with the serial number "1052."

A group of those Tucker parts floated among well-known hobbyists for decades, including in the hands of <u>Tucker Automobile Club of America</u> co-founder Stan Gilliland. When they landed with Schuler about four years ago, they finally began to come together as one.

"I think it's pretty great that somebody is taking the effort [to assemble this car] 65 years after the fact," said Jay Follis, former president of the <u>Tucker Automobile Club of America</u> Inc., and director of the <u>Tucker Historical Collection and Library</u> at the <u>Gilmore Car Museum</u> in Hickory Corners, Mich.


Schuler has charged <u>Classic & Exotic Service</u>, <u>Inc.</u> of Troy, Mich., with the assembly of his Tucker, which also uses some used parts in its construction. The foundation for the car is test chassis No. 3, which Follis said was shown in Tucker film footage driving around the plant with passengers on its two bench seats behind a cowl. This chassis was used to test an automatic transmission, although a Tucker Y1 unit will be employed in Schuler's soon-to-be-completed car. The front clip for Schuler's Tucker came from Tucker No. 1018, which was wrecked in Pennsylvania during the 1950s, and the engine is a used unit from another Tucker that received a new powerplant unit during its restoration. The vast majority of the remaining parts are never-used parts from the Tucker Corp. parts bin: a hood, front doors, quarter panels, engine cover, bumpers, speedometer, etc.

"It was pretty much in pieces," Schuler said, "it was a basket case."

Brian Joseph of Classic & Exotic Service, Inc. is masterfully bringing the parts together. The floor and roof had to be made new, but the front doors are new-old-stock. Joseph had to make the rear doors from scratch, a formidable accomplishment.

There are thousands of pieces to an automobile, so fortunately, the car came with many of the small parts, too, such as door handles and windshield wiper motor. However, a few parts had to be made in the restoration.

"I believe the most difficult part [of the restoration] was making the rear doors and the sheet metal for the roof," Schuler said. "Brian Joseph made that and has done a good job on it. He had Gilmore's [Car Museum] Tucker there [at his shop] and they used templates and patterns off of it to build these parts."

Once the Tucker is completed in early 2014, Schuler will have finally fulfilled his lifelong dream of owning a Tucker.

"I have been fascinated with buying a Tucker since I was a kid," he said. "I saw their ads in the newspaper and they were neat. I wish I had gotten involved in the Tucker earlier. I would have had a car years ago."

With the completion of Schuler's car, Follis believes the inventory of remaining original Tucker parts cannot support the build of another new Tucker. Schuler's car will, effectively, be the last Tucker. Like the "Tin Goose" Tucker prototype, the last will be maroon.

"The reason for painting it that color is the singer Sofie Tucker, who was the last of the Red Hot Mommas," Schuler said. "So my wife thought we should call our car 'Sofie' because she will be the last of the red hot Tuckers."

SAVVA Technical Tip 80 - A very special tool

It's Christmas time and most clubs don't publish a newsletter for December, so for those that do, I think we can take a bit of license.

This tip is aimed at us oldies who:

- a. cannot afford to go on holiday, or who
- b. can afford to go on holiday but don't want to.

The tool in question is a "must have" for those of us who have a tendency to drop nuts, bolts and spanners down past the engine or other vital innards. As most of us have experienced - when things fall, two things happen:

- 1. For some unknown reason, they disappear, never to be seen again, or
- 2. they roll midway under the car where one has to lie flat on ones tummy to retrieve them.

It's the latter we will address, the problem of getting up and down.

Before starting on a project you should arm yourself with the special tool pictured below, commonly referred to as a "broom". When spanners, nuts and bolts etc fall down under the car one takes the broom and "sweeps" the offending item to the side of the vehicle where it can be easily retrieved. I have a friend who is a bit smarter than me and has gone one step further and developed a stick with a magnet attached to the end which enables him to retrieve the items from the floor or that are stuck halfway down the engine bay. They say 'necessity is the mother of all inventions".

Dear Sir/ Ma'am

You are cordially invited to the 7th annual motor show in Bethlehem, hosted by the Maluti Antique Auto & Machine Club. This year the theme is 'Mean Machines'. Forming part of Bethlehem's 150th year birthday celebrations, it promises to be an exciting day with entertainment for the entire family.

Since its inception in 2003 and the hosting of motor shows since 2008, our motor club has grown exceptionally in members and the motor shows have gained invaluable exposure nationwide. This was evident in the 2013 motor show which saw close to 3 000 people attend the event.

The theme selected for the 2013 event was "A Tribute to Carroll Shelby". It was hosted in association with the South African Cobra Owners Club as well as the KwaZulu- Natal GT40 Club. An astounding 369 vehicles participated which lead to the event being the first and largest commemorative event of its kind in South Africa for this marque of cars.

Building forth on this, our show will present vintage-, muscle-, exotic-, tuner- and new cars as well as various kinds of rods & unique items, such as a 1940's military tank from WW2, tractors and stationary engines. Apart from displays, you will get the chance to have your vehicle take part in the "Spectator Drive" on the terrain. A television crew will be present and interviews held with participants. Your Mean Machine may even strut its stuff on Ignition TV or feature in one or more of the numerous motoring magazines we advertise in.

- The event will take place on Saturday the 8th of March 2014 at the Bethlehem Airfield, with the gates opening at 07:00.
- All classic cars and exhibitors receive 2 admission passes free of charge. Admission for adults is R30 per person and R20 for children. This includes a free cup of coffee or tea.
- The 'Chairman's Bring & Braai' will be held on Friday evening, the 7th of March starting at 19h00.
- Terrain security is arranged for the entire weekend and visitors wishing to park their vehicles under cover for the evening can do so at a once-off fee of R100 per car or R500 for 5 or more vehicles from the same club. A shuttle service is included in the fee. Booking is essential as there is limited space.

- Entertainment will cater for men, women and children with stalls providing food and beverages as well as flea market items for sale. Children's activities include jumping castles, tractor rides, paintball and more.
- A beer tent is available for thirsty enthusiasts.
- Club merchandise will also be for sale.
- Certificates will be issued to exhibitors and participants.
- Accommodation is available and should be booked in advance. See attached list.
- Visitors wishing to stay longer in the Eastern-Free state can gladly visit the surrounding towns of Clarens, Golden Gate, Fouriesburg and Paul Roux. The route is one of the nicest and safest in the region with very low volumes of traffic. It winds through the Sandstone cliffs of the Maluti and Witteberg mountains. Many historic places are found along the route and a breathtaking view of the Mountain Kingdom of Lesotho together with the rural atmosphere will ensure an unbelievable visit to the area.


